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
To the Citizens of Macomb County,

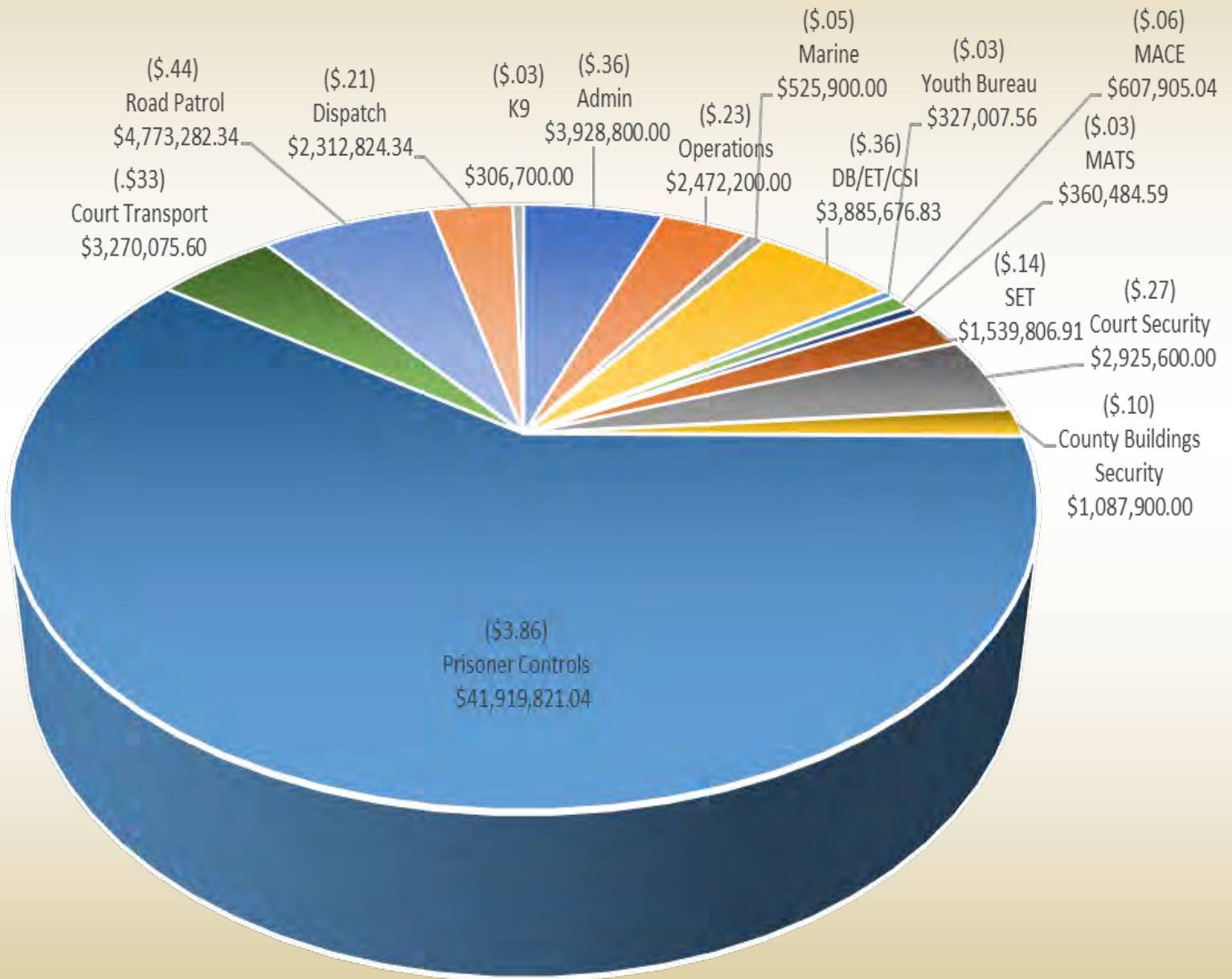


Organizational Chart

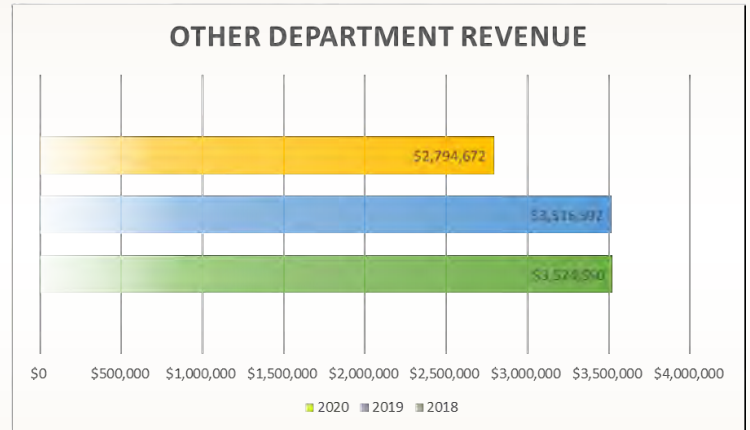
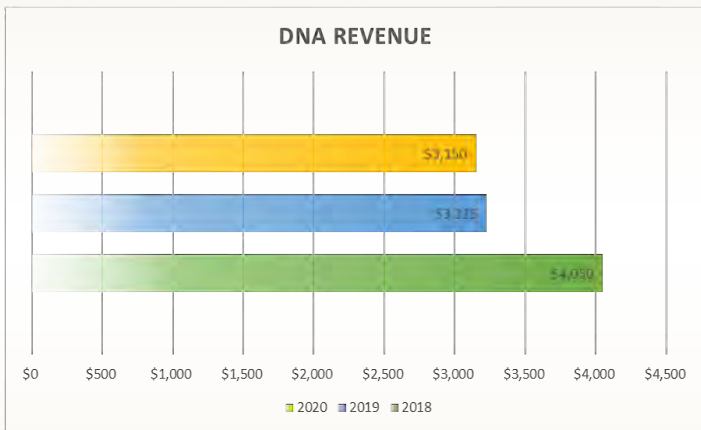
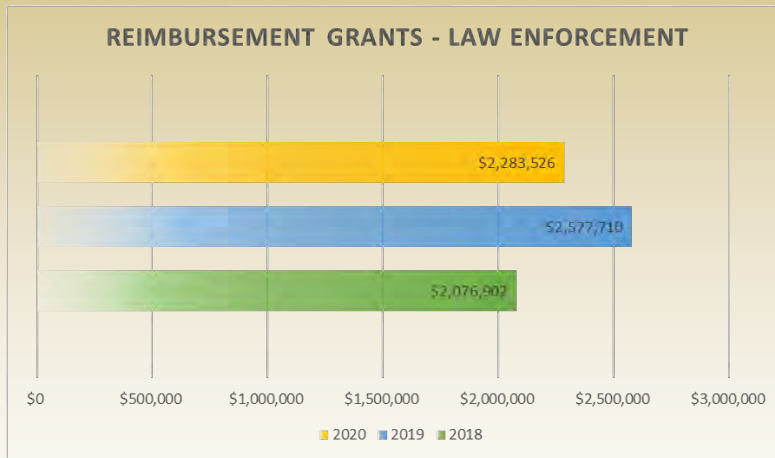

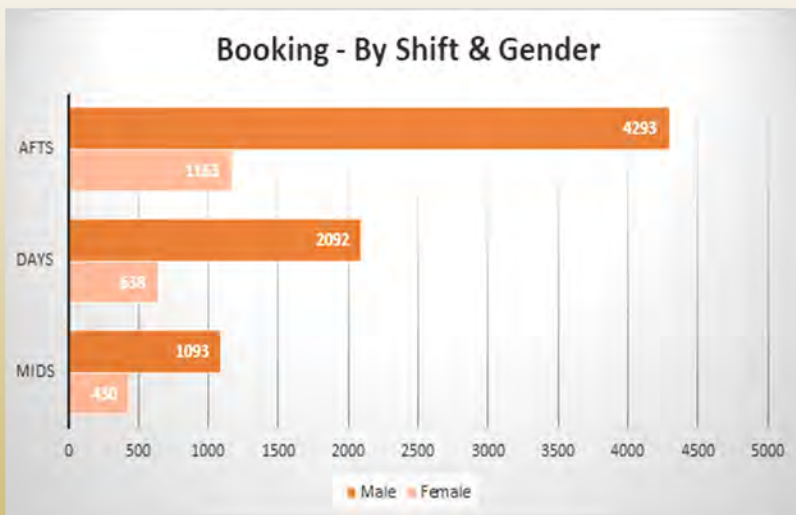
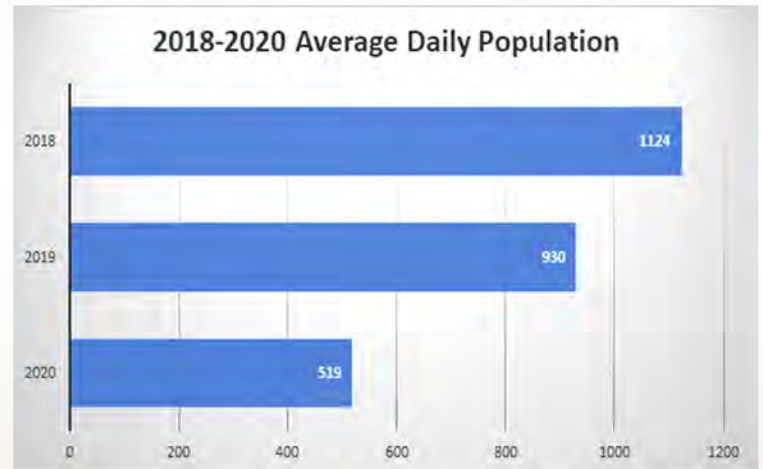
Jail Operations



The Macomb County Jail is staffed by Deputies, Command Officers and support staff. These individuals are responsible for the care and custody of all prisoners, the well-being of staff, and maintaining security and order within the jail facility.

All courts, through their Jail Bed Allocation plan and alternative sentencing assist in keeping the jail population below the design capacity. The Jail's Rated Design Capacity is 1,201.

In 2020, a total of 9,709 new prisoners were booked into this facility. That number consisted of 7478 males and 2231 females. Of those booked, 47.1% were felony charges and 43.3% were misdemeanor charges and 9.6% were nonpublic or miscellaneous. There were 10,045 inmates released during 2020.

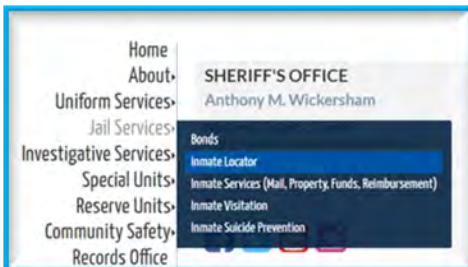


Our Jail Office staff is responsible for inmate tracking for bookings, releases, bonds, transports, court dispositions, sentences, and processing sex offender registrations.

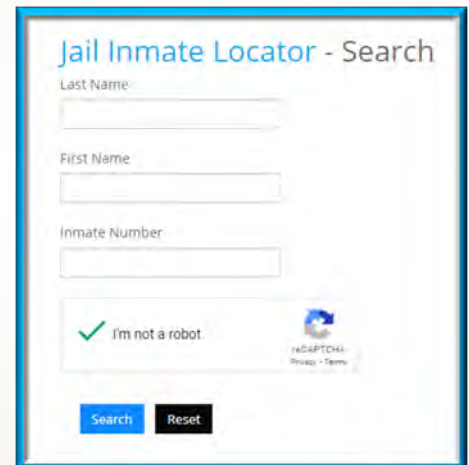
In 2020, our staff added 15,383 charges, disposed of 15,241 charges, updated court information on 18,796 inmate files, added 9,162 holds and added 2,689 sentences to inmate files.



The Inmate Locator application is available to the public allowing you to check on inmate status, bond information, and visiting information.

Video Visitation by ICSolutions is an innovative solution that provides an alternative to traditional, face-to-face inmate visitation in the Macomb County Jail.

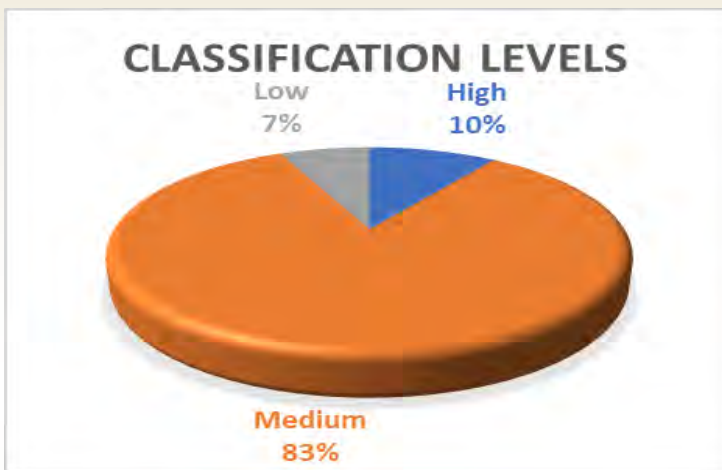
Video visitation sessions provide added value and security to our facility by removing the necessity to transport inmates for traditional onsite visitations and allows friends and family members to conduct onsite visits from a kiosk in our jail's annex as well as offsite video visitation sessions from the comfort of the visitor's home using a personal computer or laptop.

Classification Bureau

The Macomb County Sheriff's Office utilizes an objective classification plan to provide fair and consistent guidelines in determining prisoner assignments to housing areas, security level, treatment and program services. Original classifications and periodic reviews are performed to accommodate changes in charges, behavior, and to better align the jail population.



Inmate Food Services

Continental Canteen provides food services for the Macomb County Jail. Prisoner trustees help with food preparation and serving. These services include basic meals and commissary sales. Due to the COVID - 19 pandemic, the price per meal went up. The cost of each meal in January 2020 was \$1.28. During the pandemic, emergency pricing per meal was \$ 2.34. By the end of December 2020, pricing was back to \$1.28. The average cost of a meal in 2020 was \$1.56. Cost savings continue to be sought.

Inmate Health Services



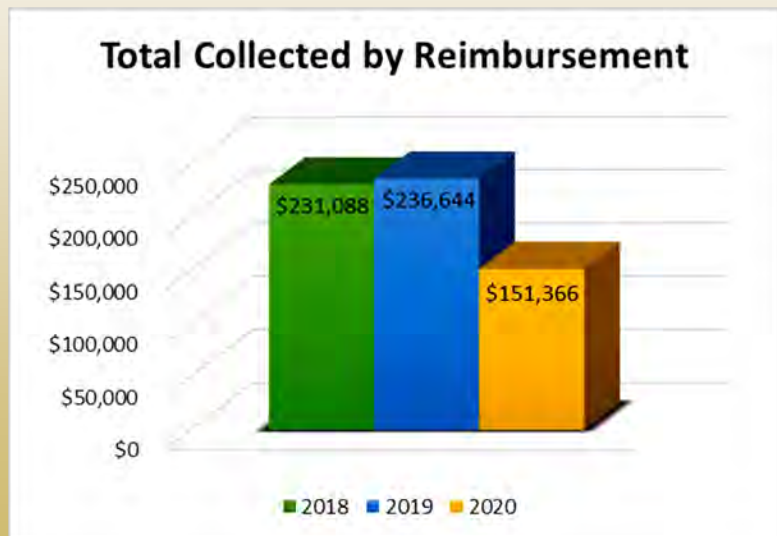
Wellpath, LLC provides medical, mental health, dental and related healthcare to inmates at the Macomb County Jail. Some of the services include preliminary screening of inmates upon arrival, a comprehensive health evaluation, regularly scheduled sick call, 24-hour nursing coverage, on-site physician visits, hospitalization, medical specialty services and administrative support. Approximately \$6.4 million dollars was spent in 2020 for prisoner healthcare.

Community Corrections

Macomb County Community Corrections is a community based sanction and rehabilitative program aimed at relieving prison and jail overcrowding through Court-approved sentencing alternatives. Non-violent offenders are placed into community sanctions, rather than in jail or prison, to allow for corrections space for more serious offenders. Rehabilitative and monitoring options include substance abuse inpatient and outpatient treatment, monitoring services, substance use testing, community service work, cognitive programming and pre-trial release supervision.

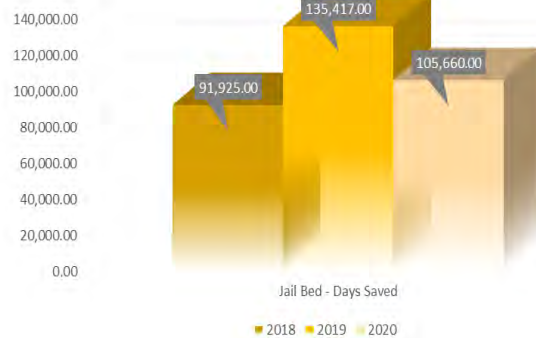
Mission Statement

Mental Health Diversion

This diversion program is run by the Macomb County Community Mental Health Department and identifies Macomb County residents in jail, or out on bond, who have mental health problems.

The intent of this program is to link offenders with services and support outside of the jail to ensure that all aspects of their mental health treatment are being met.

Corrections Emergency Response Team

The Corrections Emergency Response Team is trained to deal with unruly uncooperative inmates and riotous situations within the confines of the jail. There were 274 deployments in 2020. The CERT team has been utilized with inmates who are assaultive and requiring restraint chair for safety of inmate and staff. Handheld video and body worn camera video is reviewed by command in each deployment. CERT team has been trained in the use of taser and pepper ball. Currently there are 49 CERT trained Corrections Deputies.



Jail Ministry



The Macomb County Jail Ministry Team consists of 60 volunteers and 45 Bible Study teachers from various churches and denominations.

Bible Studies were conducted for the first three months of the year, prior to the COVID-19 pandemic. In that period, 71 classes were held with 682 participants.

Jail Ministry continued to supply Bibles, paper, pencils, clothing for released inmates, religious reading materials, bus passes and food certificates. They also supply stamped envelopes and reading glasses for the indigent. Easter and Christmas bags which are normally provided to all inmates were cancelled in 2020.

Uniform Services Section

The Uniform Services Division includes a 911 Dispatch Center, Traffic Bureau, Court Security, Prisoner Transport, K-9, Marine Division, Dive Team, Liquor Control Enforcement, Reserve Deputies, and Fleet Management.

Eight communities' contract with the Macomb County Sheriff's Office for 24/7 police services and/or dispatch services. Emergency response is provided in four townships that do not have police departments. They are Armada, Bruce, Ray and Richmond Townships.

The Sheriff's Office also responds to any nearby local, state or federal agency which requests assistance.

Honor Guard



The Honor Guard's mission is to enhance the professional image of the Macomb County Sheriff's Office, and the County of Macomb. The unit's first priority is to honor and pay respects to fallen officers and their families. Every

year they have continued to honor our own fallen officers by participating in wreath laying ceremonies honoring their sacrifice for their communities.

The 21 Honor Guard members dedicate their personal time to attend funerals and memorial services for our Brothers and Sisters in Law Enforcement, Fire Services and EMS that have lost their lives protecting and serving our citizens and our communities. In 2020, the Honor Guard completed 9 details and held 5 training days. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the in-person events of National Law Enforcement Memorial Week were cancelled.

An important part of the Honor Guard is to maintain a professional relationship with area Honor Guards. Wayne County Sheriff's Office suffered the loss of Corporal Searcy in the line of duty this year. Searcy was murdered by an inmate in the jail. Wayne County Sheriff's Office Honor Guard is a very small unit. We were requested and assisted with providing casket watch during the viewing at the funeral. We also provided the standing color guard and casket team the day of the funeral. At the end of 2020, Wayne County Sheriff Benny Napoleon died due to COVID-19. Our unit once again assisted with funeral details when requested.

All of the financial support has come solely from Honor Guard Members, fundraising, and donations received from citizens. In 2020, due to the pandemic, the annual dinner fundraiser was canceled. A raffle was held in its place and that drawing was held live on Facebook.

Dispatch Center

In 2020, a large focus for our dispatch center was hiring and training. At the end of the year, staffing included 55 staffed dispatch positions leaving us short nine positions. COVID restrictions limited (and paused) our ability to test candidates which is the first step in the hiring process. While this may have slowed additional new hires, seven new dispatchers were still able to be hired. In addition, 12 vacancies were created for a variety of reasons.

Early on in 2020, many months were spent exploring and testing a variety of Dispatch applicant eligibility tests. Our then current test was outdated and required a minimum of 25 words per minute. This test failed to relate to current job responsibilities and the typing minimum was below average compared to most dispatch centers. In effort to test all candidates with a more realistic exam of true duties and responsibilities of our staff a significant change was made. After consulting with the Sheriff's Administration and Civil Service, CriteCall became the new Dispatch candidate exam and the typing minimum was raised to 40 words per minute. The first proctored CriteCall test was held in August.

Dispatch Center

As defined in Michigan Legislature, Dispatchers in the state are required to complete initial training courses. These courses include a 40-hour basic telecommunicator training course that must be completed within 18 months of hire. Within 24 months of hire, dispatchers must complete another 40-hour advanced training course. Once training requirements are completed a telecommunicator is considered designated. Designated Dispatchers are required to complete 24 hours of training every 24 months. If a designated Dispatcher fails to complete training required, a noncompliance notification is sent to the agency which can potentially result in loss of training funds. MCSO Dispatchers are fully compliant with state required training standards and policies. In addition to state required training all MCSO staff must remain agency compliant on EMD certifications as well as CPR/AED and Basic First AID. In 2020 there have been significant structure changes to providing the training.

All staff also completes monthly, web-based training, provided by Police Legal Sciences. PLS training keeps all staff compliant by meeting the requirement of 24 credits every 2 years. Any additional outside training is counted toward continuing education credit as well. The Macomb County Dispatchers completed 1,432 hours of training in 2020.

Macomb County Dispatch was proud to receive the 2020 Tyler Technology Excellence Award as well as having two command officers selected to hold seats on two separate 911 state subcommittees; Emerging Technology Subcommittee and the 911 Training Subcommittee.

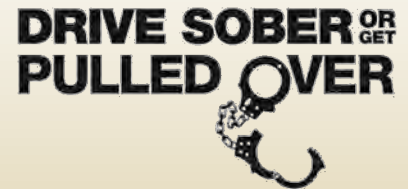
Traffic Bureau

In 2020, the Traffic Bureau was made up of (1) Sergeant and (4) Deputies.

Deputy responsibilities include investigating motor vehicle crashes, motor carrier enforcement, traffic enforcement in problem areas, special event details, child seat inspections, dignitary protection, occasional speaking events and enforcing traffic laws throughout the county. Traffic Deputies are required to work and/or change their schedules whenever the need may arise in Macomb County, or when they are called upon by the Sheriff and/or his designee.

Sergeant responsibilities include scheduling, review and approval of all traffic crash reports, collecting traffic statistics, radar trailer deployment, tracking vehicles and traffic equipment. The Sergeant also attends numerous seminars, traffic related meetings with various organizations as well as managing and applying for all grants.

This year, Macomb County secured \$185,070 in state grant monies from the Office of Highway Safety Planning compared to \$172,000 in 2019. As the Project Director for Macomb County during the 2020 traffic grant, the Traffic Sergeant worked closely with OHSP to disseminate the money amongst eight additional participating law enforcement agencies within the county. This money was used for seatbelt enforcement, impaired driving enforcement, speeding enforcement, red light enforcement and distracted driving enforcement campaigns throughout the year.



Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, school districts conducted virtual classes eliminating school bus transportation for most of the year. Traffic deputies did not receive complaints for motorists running the school bus red lights. In the Fall of 2020, five complaints were received from the local school districts and all vehicles were the license plate information was captured, a letter was sent to the registered owner.

The Traffic Bureau continued to conduct limited car seat inspections during the COVID-19 pandemic. A deputy, certified in car seat inspections, practiced social distancing and wore a mask while conducting 10 car seat installations in 2020.

Two deputies are certified to conduct Motor Carrier inspections and answer complaints from the Macomb County Road Commission and local agencies to assist in enforcing motor carrier laws throughout Macomb County when requested. One of these deputies is also federally certified and in addition to his daily patrol duties, conducted 34 Level I truck inspections.

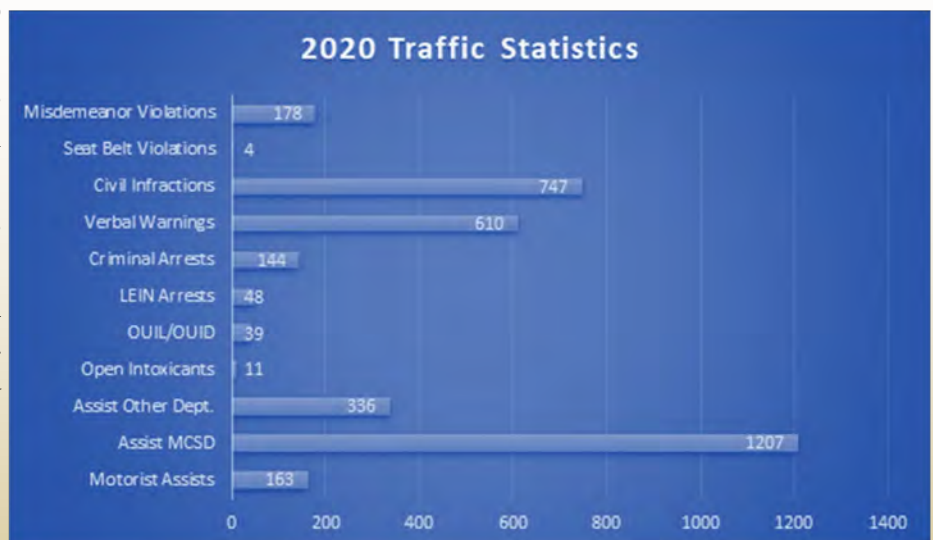


Level I – North American Standard Inspections

- ▶ Most comprehensive of the inspections, it includes examination of compliance with the critical elements of both driver and vehicle regulations. A Level I inspection takes about 45-60 minutes to complete.

In 2020, The Traffic Bureau secured \$439,705 from the Office of Highway Safety Planning for Secondary Road Patrol. We also received additional funding from OHSP through a contract adjustment for \$103,460, giving us a total budget for the Secondary Road Patrol (SRP) of \$543,165 which allowed us to have three SRP positions.

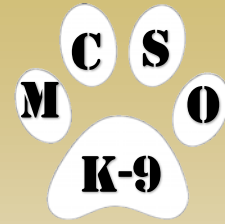
During 2020, the Traffic Bureau responded to and investigated 303 property damage crashes, 99 personal injury crashes which includes 5 fatal crashes, for a total of 430 traffic crash investigations. The Traffic Division investigated approximately 10% of the total crashes investigated by the entire Sheriff's Office. The Traffic Bureau issued 825 total combined violations, gave 282 verbal warnings and patrolled over 23,857 miles on Macomb County Roads during 2020.



Although the COVID-19 pandemic cancelled many annual events, the Traffic Bureau still assisted the Secret Service and local law enforcement agencies in 14 major details.

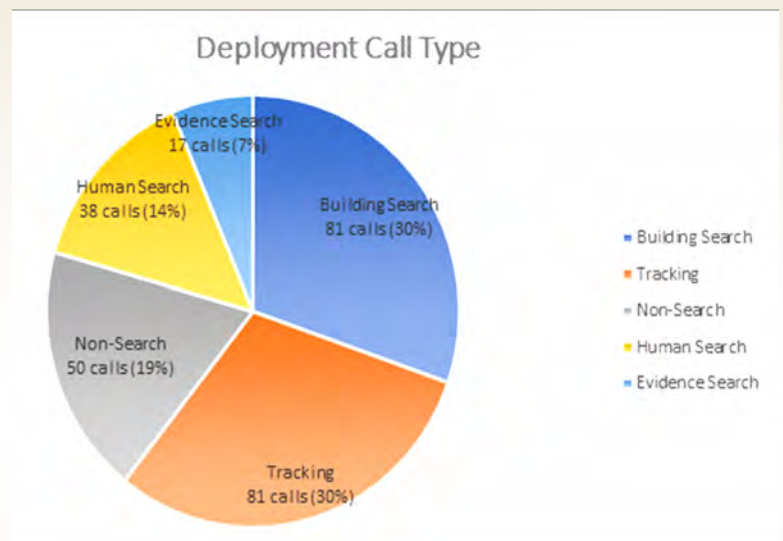
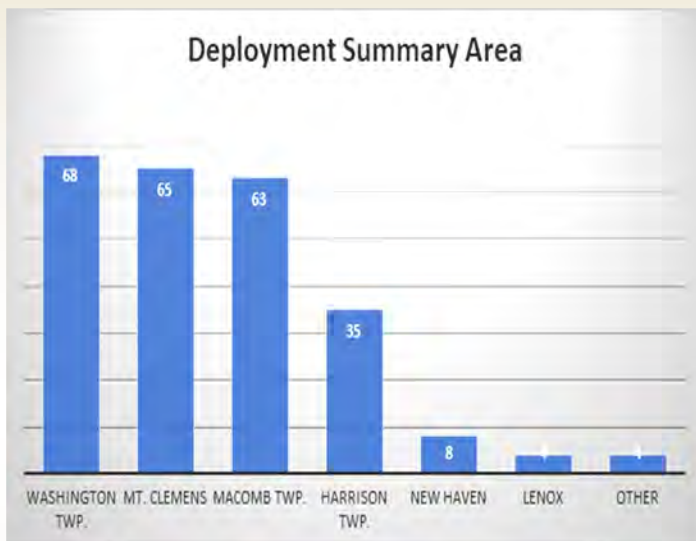

The Sheriff's Office five K-9 teams have proven to be an effective resource for us as well as for local, state, and federal agencies which we assist. K-9 teams are utilized to locate lost persons, track suspects from crime scenes, locate narcotics and articles, suspects that are hiding, building searches, locating explosives, etc. Macomb County Sheriff's narcotic dogs are the first and only K-9's to be trained in the odor of Soboxone.

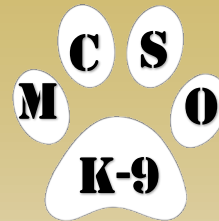


The Macomb County K-9 Unit trains weekly with various departments in police tracking, apprehension, article searches, along with detection with explosives and narcotics. Additionally, K-9's train while at home with their handlers and during patrol to keep them to national standards for police departments. All Macomb County K-9 teams certify annually in their specialties through National Association of Professional Canine Handlers whom is recognized and utilized in southeast Michigan. During 2020, Macomb County K-9 teams were deployed over 345 times.

K-9 Saber will be retiring in January of 2021. He has had a great career and will be spending his retirement with his handler and family.

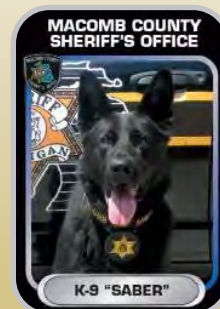
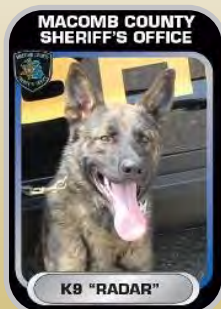

Marine Division

The Macomb County Sheriff's Marine patrol strives to keep everyone safe on the waterways of Macomb County through education and enforcement.



The Marine Division patrols Lake St. Clair, which has been called the busiest freshwater lake in the world. It is renowned for its fishing and fisherman from across the Midwest travel to Lake St. Clair as a top fishing destination. During the boating season there are also various special events that are held on Lake St. Clair with the Marine Division deploying resources with a specific emphasis placed on promoting water safety. Whether it be a sanctioned event or non-sanctioned event (Jobbie-Nooner, Raft Off, and various boating parades), the Macomb County Marine Division is prepared. Lake St. Clair covers approximately 85 square miles with 30.5 miles of shoreline connecting to 57 miles of rivers and lakes.

The Sheriff's Marine Division is responsible for enforcing Michigan Marine law, investigating boat accidents, conducting livery inspections, search and rescue operations, ice rescues, body recovery and instructing safe boating classes. Working with the assistance of 75 volunteer Marine Reserve Deputies allows us to meet those responsibilities. In 2020, the reserve unit voluntarily dedicated 7,306.50 hours to the Marine Division's primary mission of marine safety.

The division also works with federal agencies to assist in Border Security and was an active partner in the Department of Homeland Security grant funded Operation Stonegarden initiative. The Operation Stonegarden initiative supports cooperation and coordination in the joint effort to secure the US border(s) to include international water borders.

Marine Division

Boater's Safety Instruction

The Marine Division teaches the state approved boater's safety course "Boat Michigan – a course on responsible boating." During the winter months our deputies are primarily in the seventh-grade classes, teaching boaters' safety at both public and private schools. Due to the COVID pandemic causing school closings in March 2020, we were unable to continue teaching the boater safety classes to the middle school students. Prior to the schools' closings we were able to teach a total of 50 middle school classes, reaching 2,640 students. In the Fall of 2020, we had to adapt to the new technology style and were able to design an online program to teach the students virtually. Without the pandemic, the Marine Division teaches an excess of 5,000 students. Our marine reservists teach the same classes to adult learners in the evenings free of charge.

Dive Team

The Macomb County Sheriff's Underwater Search and Recovery Team (MCSO USRT) is tasked with the recovery of evidence and persons. The team is comprised of 12 members. The Macomb County Sheriff's Office Underwater Search and Recovery Team is the only active member in the Urban Areas Security Initiative (UASI), from which funding was obtained for training.

The MCSO USRT trains once a month in several different types of environments. Training ensures that the deputies stay familiar with their equipment and become more accustomed to different types of dive environments. Due to the COVID pandemic, it was necessary to cancel five monthly training dates. Some of the environments trained in 2020 include swift current in the local rivers, heavy vegetation areas in Lake St. Clair, blackout conditions in the Clinton River and ice diving during the winter months.

The MCSO USRT was utilized five times in 2020. These call outs were for body recoveries, evidence and property recoveries and to assist other agencies. MCSO USRT strives to continue with successful recoveries in the future.

Court Security

The Macomb County Sheriff's Office Inmate Transport and Court Security Division is responsible for providing safety and security to the judges, courthouse staff, lawyers, inmates, and public. This also includes security for the offices of the County Commissioners, Prosecutors, and Treasurer's Office, Friend of the court, Probate court, Old County Building, Reimbursement, Probation Department, and other ancillary offices of Macomb County within the locations listed above.

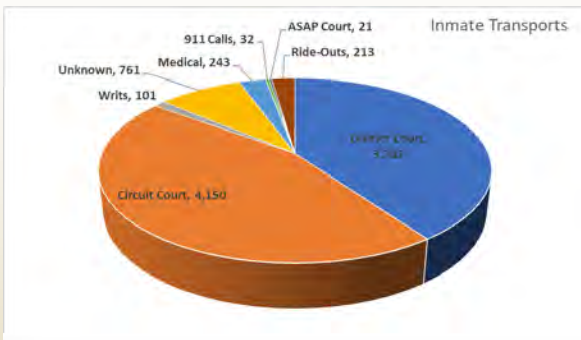


It is the duty of the Protective Service Officers to screen the public for any items that could be considered weapons when entering the county buildings.

In 2020, there were 12 incidents that required deputy intervention. These incidents included several disorderly persons, mental health interventions and threats towards judicial staff. No individuals were harmed during these incidents.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, many of the judicial and administrative hearings were held remotely. A majority of the Judges and staff worked off site. Deputy positions that normally served these courtrooms did not have to be utilized and were reallocated to other duties such as extra patrols, jail details or utilized where needed.

Inmate Transport



The Sheriff's Office is also responsible for the transporting of inmates to the District Courts and the 16th Circuit Court for arraignments, trials and sentencing.

The District Courts include 37-B Centerline, 41-B Clinton Township, 38th Eastpointe, 42-2 New Baltimore, 42-1Romeo, 39th Rosville, 41-A Shelby Township, 40th St. Clair Shores, 41-A Sterling

Heights, and 37 -A Warren.

Other prisoner transports include but are not limited to hospitals, prisons, in and out of state warrant pickups, and psychological testing centers.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020, transport statistics were down 47.3% compared to that of 2019. The Prisoner Transport Division traveled a total of 174,835 miles in 2020.

Liquor Enforcement

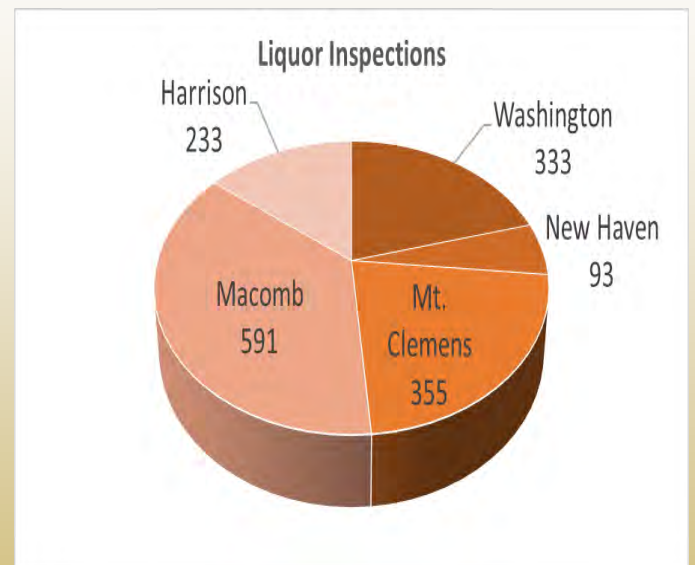
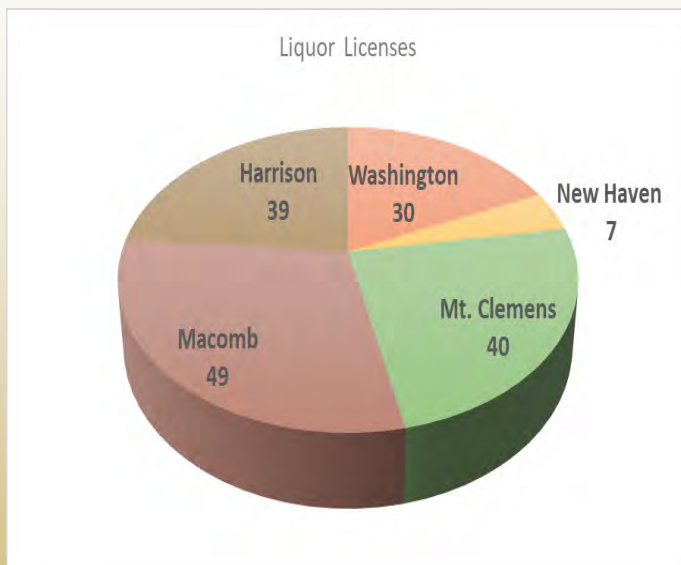
The Macomb County Sheriff's Office, under the authority of PA 58 of 1998, enforces the provisions of the statute of the Michigan Liquor Control Code. The responsibilities granted to the sheriff include:

- 1) Inspections of licensed establishments.
- 2) Conducting criminal background checks on all new and transfer liquor license applications.
- 3) Ensuring that the building housing the licensed establishment meets local code.
- 4) Granting special one-day liquor licenses.
- 5) Conducting investigation at licensed establishments targeting the sale and consumption of alcoholic beverages by minors.

In addition to the duties assigned to deputies in our patrol areas, they also conduct inspections of licensed liquor establishments throughout the year. These inspections are done randomly and verify that the licensees are operating within the guidelines established by the Liquor Control Commission.

The Sheriff's Office also receives requests by the Liquor Control Commission to investigate complaints that are filed directly with the L.C.C. Many of these complaints involve a suspension or the placing "in escrow" of a liquor license due to lack or proper documentation (insurance certificates), or the temporary suspension due to the seasonal nature of the business by the licensee.

In 2020, twelve special permits were issued to non-profit groups wishing to sell alcoholic beverages at special events within the Macomb Sheriff's patrol jurisdiction.

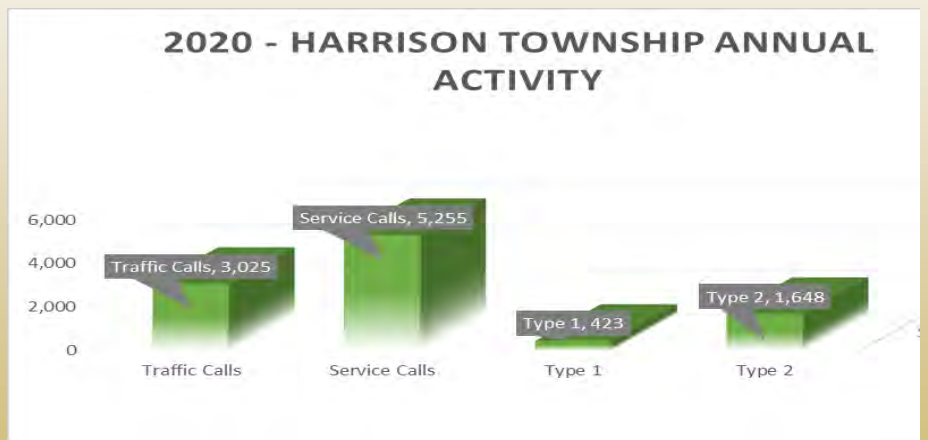
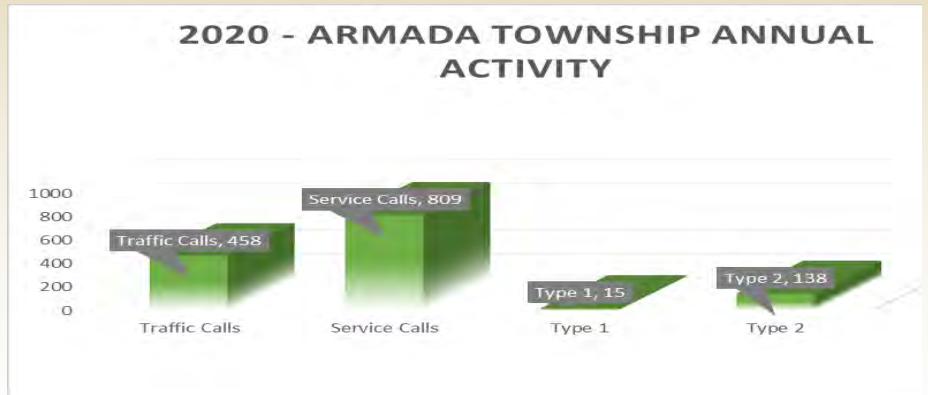

Detective Bureau



The Detective Bureau staff consists of four supervisors including one lieutenant and three sergeants, thirteen detectives, and two clerical staff. In addition to their regular duties, each supervisor has additional responsibilities that require special attention. Those responsibilities include the oversight of the Polygraph Unit, Youth Bureau, and Friend of the Court (F.O.C.) Enforcement Unit.

In 20, the MCSO Detective Bureau handled a total of 3,068 cases compared to 3,641 cases in 2019.

The Detective Bureau conducts investigations for the Townships of Armada, Bruce, Harrison, Lenox, Macomb, Ray, Richmond and Washington; the City of Mt. Clemens and the Village of New Haven.

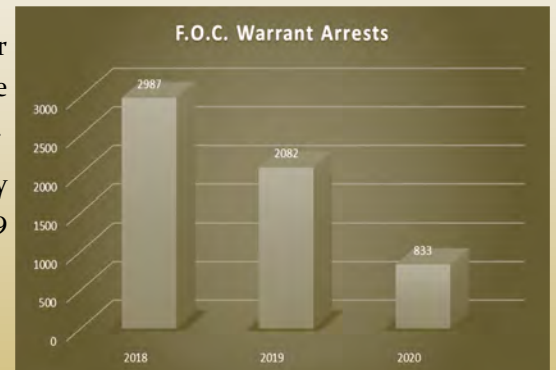

Friend of the Court (F.O.C.)

There are six Deputies assigned to the FOC Enforcement Unit. The FOC Unit works in conjunction with the Friend of the Court to enforce support orders. There are two (2) 2-person arrest teams who actively pursue and arrest those who fail to make court ordered child support payments. Additionally, two (2) FOC deputies are assigned to the FOC Office who provide intelligence for the two enforcement arrest teams.

Friend of the Court enforcement deputies affected 833 arrests/resolutions for bench and other arrest warrant for failure to pay child support in 2020. The total amount of arrearages accounted for by those arrest equals \$7,229,817.00.

In previous years, unannounced enforcement sweeps were conducted by F.O.C. investigators and MCSO Detectives. However, due to the COVID -19 pandemic, such sweeps did not take place for the year 2020.

Youth Bureau Services

The Youth Bureau is comprised of experienced investigators, one D.A.R.E. Officer, and three School Resource officers (S.R.O.). The S.R.O. Deputies are assigned to the Chippewa Valley and Romeo School Districts.

The Youth Bureau handled 151 investigative complaints in 2020. This compares to 218 investigative complaints in 2019.

Two S.R.O. Deputies are assigned to the Chippewa Valley Schools campus in Macomb Township; one is based out of Dakota High School and 9th grade center and the second is assigned to the elementary and middle schools. However, these two deputies assist each other in their respective areas as situations arise. A third S.R.O. is assigned to the Romeo School District which is comprised of four elementary schools, two middle schools, and two high schools.

A total of 15 threats of violence directed at schools within the jurisdiction of the Sheriff's Office were investigated during the 2019-2020 school year. Of the 15 cases, 11 had criminal charges authorized for Intention Threat to Commit Act of Violence Against a School.



One additional Deputy is assigned to the Drug Abuse Resistance and Education (D.A.R.E.) position. This Deputy facilitates education to students in the Chippewa valley, Mt. Clemens, and Utica School Districts as well as to four private schools. D.A.R.E. is a 10-week curriculum taught one day a week in each class and then there is a graduation ceremony. Students are awarded for participation and for their individual accomplishments. During the fall semester of the 2019-2020 school year, 474 students graduated from the DARE program. During the winter semester of the 2019-2020 school year, 504 students graduated from the program. Due to COVID-19 state restrictions on in-person learning within the school system, the DARE program was not offered during the spring semester of the 2019-2020 school year. The total number of DARE graduates for the 2019-2020 school year was 978.

Crash Investigations Unit (C.I.U.)

The crash investigation unit (C.I.U.) is comprised of four Deputies and two Sergeants. The unit's primary function is to investigate fatal crashes or serious injury crashes likely to result in a fatality. The unit is also responsible for the reconstruction of all crashes resulting in criminal prosecution. Additionally, the crash unit is responsible for insuring that all evidence is documented, photographed, and collected so a thorough investigation and/or reconstruction can be completed.



The CIU was activated 13 times in 2020. Of the 13 activations, five were MCSO fatalities and eight were serious injury crashes. The FARO Scene & Zone software was utilized for all 13 crashes. The CIU was also requested to assist with scanning (FARO) on cases for outside agencies

Evidence Technicians

Although deputies assigned as evidence technicians may assist in handling calls for service, their primary role at a crime scene is the collections, preservation and processing of evidence. Macomb County Sheriff's Office evidence technicians not only function in that capacity of the Sheriff's Office, but also assist other local law enforcement agencies as requested. This year, 17,257 items were taken into the property room.

The Evidence Technician Property Room Deputy empties the medication drip box located at the MCSO lobby command desk twice per week. An estimated 60 pounds of medication are incinerated monthly.

Evidence Technicians were requested to incident scenes to assist by using the FARO for 3D scene imaging for 26 cases. Of which, 22 were for MCSO cases and 4 were for other law enforcement agencies.



Polygraph

One deputy is assigned as a Polygraph Examiner to conduct polygraph examinations for the Sheriff's Office, other police agencies, and for the Macomb County Prosecutor's Office as requested. In 2020, there were 87 polygraph cases scheduled. Of the 87 cases, 23 were cancelled and 16 were not conducted due to subjects failing to appear. Polygraph examinations that were conducted resulted in 11 "deception indicated", 24 "no deception indicated", 5 "inconclusive."

The COVID-19 pandemic had an impact on the amount of polygraph examinations conducted during the 2020 calendar year. The polygraph deputy used undedicated polygraph time to assist the MCSO Office of Professional Standards with criminal cases that occurred within the inmate population of the Macomb County Jail. The polygraph Deputy oversaw 50 criminal cases that occurred within the confines of the jail. The polygraph deputy also assisted the MCSO Detective Bureau by conducting 6 job application background investigations.



In 8 of the polygraph examinations, the polygraph operator was able to obtain pre-test confessions.

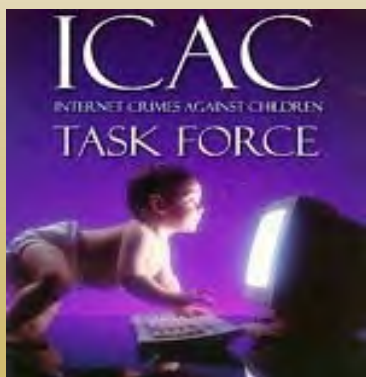
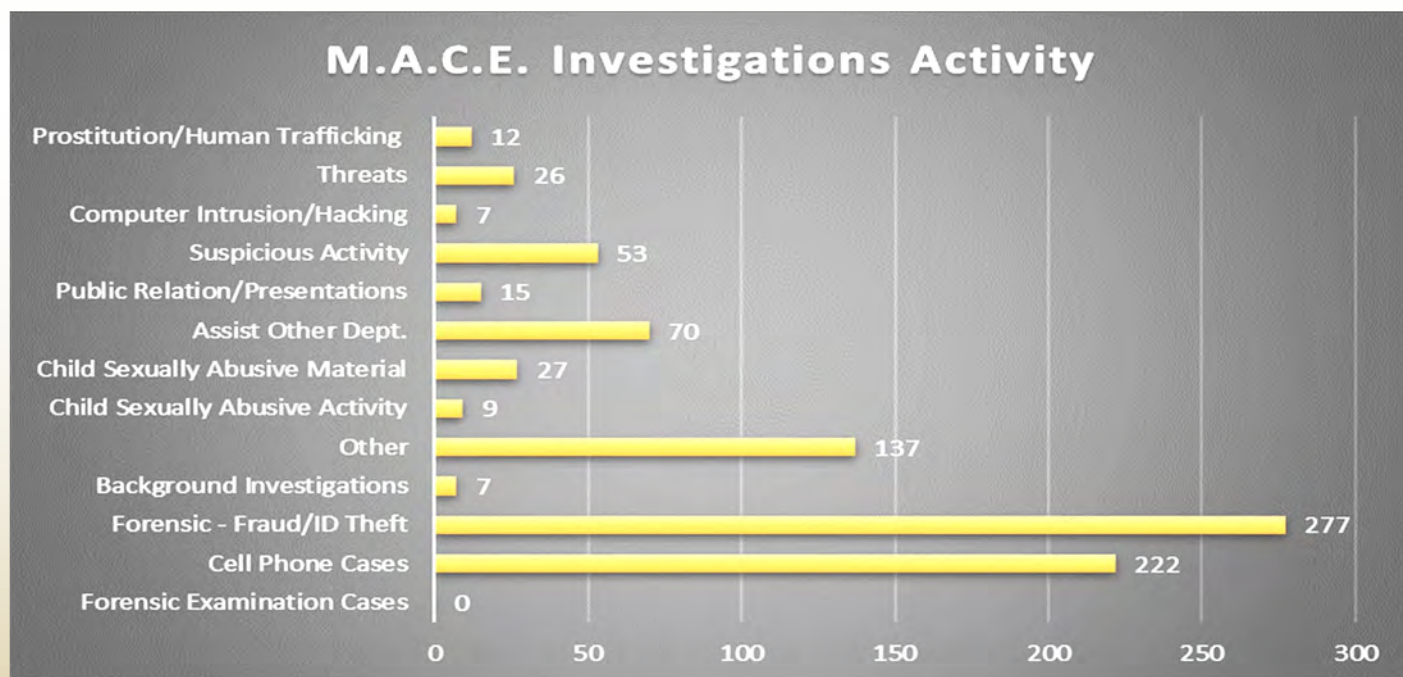
Macomb Area Computer Enforcement (M.A.C.E.)

The Macomb Area Computer Enforcement unit (M.A.C.E.) is a computer crime task force assigned to investigate computer crimes such as computer fraud, identity theft, and child sexual exploitations. This year, the unit opened 862 cases and arrested 13 subjects for various criminal activities.

Computer crimes are often difficult to investigate due to crossing jurisdictional lines, as well as the increase in communication technology available: such as smart phones and on-line games through which children are solicited. M.A.C.E investigators assist other local law enforcement agencies with computer crime investigations.

M.A.C.E. maintains a partnership with Michigan ICAC (Internet Crimes Against Children).

M.A.C.E. continues to assist with education and prevention endeavors in local schools educating all grade levels of students, teachers and parents regarding cyber-crime and safe use of the Internet. M.A.C.E also presents internet safety seminars for senior citizen and church groups.

Sheriff Enforcement Team (S.E.T.)

The Sheriff's Enforcement Team (SET) provides undercover police services working under the authority of Macomb County Sheriff Anthony Wickersham. Detectives assigned to SET conduct narcotics related investigations, apprehend fugitives, conduct surveillance, and investigate high profile cases which may include homicide, robberies, residential break-ins and assaultive crimes. To complete the mission at SET, investigators rely on crime reports, anonymous tips, confidential informants and established traditional methods of police work.

Bureaus within the SET unit include the Narcotics Bureau, County of Macomb Enforcement (COMET), U.S. Marshal Task Force (DFAT), Macomb Area Computer Enforcement

(MACE), two Drug Enforcement Agency task forces (DEA-Group 8 and FANTOM), and a Federal Bureau of Investigations task force. There are a total of 16 Sheriff's personnel assigned to these various units which consists of one Lieutenant, three Sergeants and 12 Deputies.

During 2020, SET units investigated more than 1,800 cases, executed 80 physical search warrants and 169 administrative search warrants related to electronic forensics. These investigations resulted in 262 arrests, which included multiple child sexually abusive activity cases, narcotics related jail cases, homicide, home invasions, armed robberies, and violent felony warrant arrests.

The SET Unit seized and forfeited over \$132,000 in cash and property. Approximately \$117,000 in narcotics were taken off the streets of Macomb County. As a result of the Sheriff assigning personnel to federal task forces, we received over \$323,000 of equitable sharing from the Federal Asset Forfeiture system.

Drug Enforcement Agency (D.E.A.)



The Sheriff's Enforcement Team has personnel assigned to two Drug Enforcement Agency task forces. SET personnel assigned to these task forces conduct covert investigations that typically reach beyond the Southeast Michigan region: into and across the United States and beyond the U.S. Border. During 2020, the DEA reimbursed the Sheriff's Office approximately \$30,000 in overtime costs.



Fugitive Apprehension

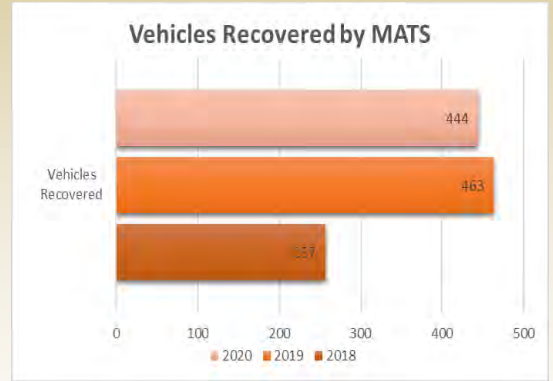
The Sheriff's Enforcement Team has personnel assigned to the U.S. Marshal Apprehension team. Personnel assigned to this unit focus on violent criminal that either reside or have committed crimes in Macomb County. Being involved in this unit give out deputies authority to conduct apprehension investigations beyond our county and have jurisdiction nationwide. During 2020, the U.S. Marshals reimbursed the Sheriff's Office approximately \$35,000 in overtimes costs.



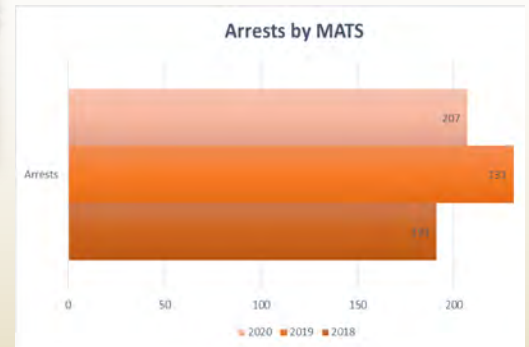
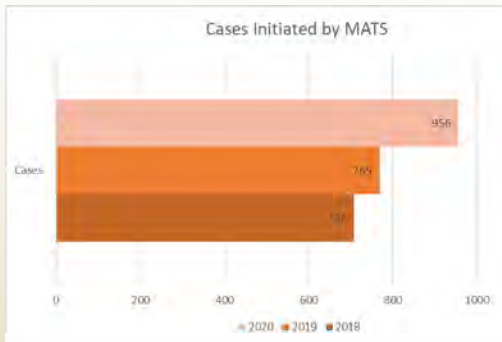

Macomb Auto Theft Squad (M.A.T.S.)

The Macomb Auto Theft Squad is a multi-jurisdictional task force comprised of investigators from the Macomb County Sheriff's Office, Centerline Department of Public Safety, Clinton Township Police Department, Eastpointe Police Department, Roseville Police Department, Shelby Township Police Department, St. Clair Shores Police Department, Sterling Heights Police Department and the Warren Police department. The unit's manpower totals eleven Detectives and one full time secretary. In addition, the Macomb County Prosecutor's Office received funding to provide a full-time assistant prosecutor to the squad to prosecute all cases generated by M.A.T.S. and to initiate forfeiture proceedings as mandated by law. The Macomb Auto Theft Squad investigates auto theft and its related crimes including insurance fraud.



In 2020, the 956 opened investigations included but were not limited to Car Jacking, UDAA, LFA, and Fraudulent Activities. In 2020, MATS Detectives recovered approximately \$8,005,062.00 in vehicle and property recoveries which were returned back to the insurance companies and victims.



The Macomb Auto Theft Squad received funding from the Michigan Automobile Theft Prevention Authority (ATPA). The ATPA is funded by an annual assessment on automobile insurance companies at \$1 per motor vehicle including passenger and commercial motor vehicles. Since the inception of the ATPA in 1986, auto thefts in Michigan has decreased by 62%. Nationally, thefts have decreased by almost 40% as well. ATPA's success in the battle against auto theft is the direct result of dedication and efforts of the men and women who are apart of law enforcement agencies, prosecutor offices, and community organizations. *Michigan

Special Weapons and Tactics (S.W.A.T.)

The Macomb County Sheriff's Office SWAT team is a tactical team that operates through a cooperative effort with the Chesterfield Police Department, Eastpointe Police Department, Utica Police Department and new Baltimore Police Department. The Macomb County Sheriff's SWAT team assists departmental personnel and outside agencies during circumstances that involve potentially life-threatening situations. Responses include but are not limited to the following: Barricaded Subject(s), snipping incidents, search and arrest warrants - when considered high-risk (likelihood of armed or combative subjects), CBRNE terrorist events, hostage situations, workplace and school violence situations, executive protections.

SWAT team members include law enforcement officers as well as medical personnel. The team typically trains two days per month, completes one week of specialized training, and one week of refresher training per year. The Macomb County Sheriff SWAT team is currently the only team regionally that meets the level two type criteria on a national level. In 2020, there were a total of 27 SWAT operators and 4 medical personnel.

In 2020, The Macomb County Sheriff SWAT team received three calls for service. The first call was in New Baltimore and the suspect willingly came out of the residence after several hours. The second call was in Harrison Township and involved a hostage. The hostage was able to escape unharmed and the suspect exited the home and was taken into custody. The last call was to assist Warren with a planned protest. During this event there were no issues.



Administrative Services

Training Division

The Training Division is responsible for all training of Macomb County Sheriff's Office officers and support staff. This includes new hires, promotions, and record tracking required by the state. In addition, the Training Division is responsible for recruitment, facilitating presentations, and jail tours to various community groups.

The Administrative Lieutenant maintains oversight of the Macomb County Sheriff's Office Training Division and the Firearms Division/Armory. There are two sergeants assigned to the training division, one sergeant to Firearms, and one secretary that assists both divisions. The Training Division facilitates all training for Macomb County Sheriff's Office, both in-service and advanced training at various locations. Total agency training of all personnel was 17,163 hours, a decline from 2019. The decline was mainly due to the fact summer trainings were cancelled and/or suspended because of Covid-19.

The Training Division coordinates the training to assure that our employees meet the 20 hour training requirement set forth by the Michigan Sheriff's Coordinating and Training Council. In 2020, the number of employees subject to the 20 hours training requirement was 434. The Training Division is proud to report that 100% compliance was achieved for the mandatory 20 hour training requirement. In 2020, the Training Division utilized online computer based training to assist in achieving this requirement



In 2020 the Training Division was involved in a number of upgrades and projects:

- ◆ Silver status awarded by Michigan Veterans Affairs Agency
- ◆ Facilitated Training for updated MCSO/HR policies in Virtual Academy.
- ◆ Firearms Division assisted in the training of the C.E.R.T. team.
- ◆ Virtual Academy secured for online training platform for 2020.
- ◆ Drone Unit recertification training class for MCSO deputies.
- ◆ Updated FTO DOR's to electronic version.
- ◆ Five new duty weapons were put in service along with 99 rifles.
- ◆ Hosted two career/recruiting events at MCSO.

Firearms Training Division



The Firearms Division of the Sheriff's Office conducted training and qualifications for over 650 people on our range, some on as many as four weapon systems. Qualifications included departmental qualifications, state assessments, reserve qualifications, corrections and clerical CPL training, and PSO qualifications. Firearms and Taser training included weapon operation, handling proficiency, tactics, marksmanship and subject control.

The Firearms Division also conducted a CPL class for corrections and clerical staff. Twenty-six members were able to fulfill the requirements necessary to obtain their CPL in a convenient manner and at a substantial cost savings to them.

The Firearms Division facilitated a Reserve Academy for 18 new MCSO Reserves. The reserves were trained in Firearms Qualification, First Aid, Report Writing, Radio, Use of Force/Subject Control and Handcuffing.

The Firearms Division along with the Uniformed Services Division worked together to purchase new Axon Taser 7's for the agency to replace our aging Axon X26p's. The Taser's will be deployed in 2021.

Reserve Units

Community involvement is one of the key missions of the Sheriff's Office, and that is no more evident than with the Reserve Units. There are eight distinct units: A.C.E., ATV, Aviation, Cyber Crimes, Marine, Mountain Bike, Mounted, and Motorcycle. Members of each unit volunteer their time and their own equipment to assist the Sheriff's Office. Two other volunteer groups who donate their time to serve the citizens of Macomb County are Senior Volunteers and Explorers.

The 11,449 hours the reserves and volunteers donated in 2020 is equivalent to \$35,707 in funding for the county.

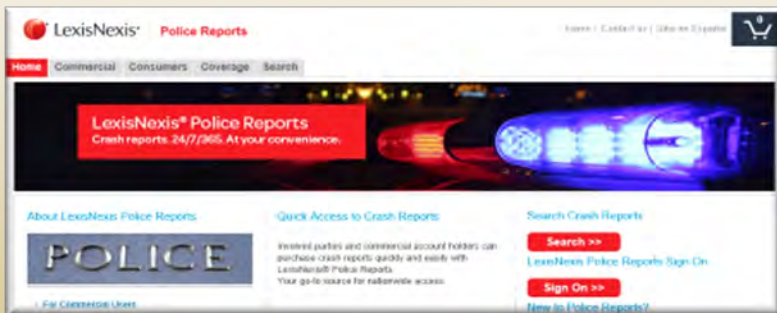

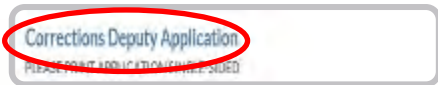
